SEED STARTING 101

EVERYTHING YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT STARTING SEEDS INDOORS

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WHY START SEEDS INDOORS?

EXTENDS YOUR SEASON

You can't plant outdoors until last risk of frost has passed

Starting your seeds indoors allows you to get a head start, so when that frost date has passed, you can plant transplants in the dirt outdoors

GIVES YOU MORE VARIETY

When you buy your transplants from the store, you are limited to the handful of ones they decide to grow. You can grow all kinds of fun varieties of vegetables buy purchasing unique seeds that you wouldn't find anywhere else.

CONTROLLED GERMINATION

Because you are controlling the environment (temperature, weather conditions, etc) you have a higher chance of seeds germinating when started indoors

YOU CAN SELECT THE STRONGEST PLANTS

Not all seeds are created equal.
Starting your seeds indoors
allows you to pick the strongest
one and transplant that one to
your garden.

SAVES MONEY

The first year you will invest in your heat mats and lights, but after that, you will save loads of money each year by not having to buy transplants at the store at \$3-5 each.

PREVENT PESTS AND WEATHER DAMAGE TO YOUNG SEEDLINGS

Young plants are delicate, and birds love to eat them. Starting your seeds indoors protects them from harsh rain, and birds/insects wanting to eat them.



SUPPLIES YOU'LL NEED

MEDIUM (SOIL)

Use "Seed Starting Mix". I like Black Gold brand.

You can also use "peat pots" like <u>THIS</u> one here if you prefer.

SEED TRAYS

You need to have trays to plant your seeds in. I like to find ones that have 72 cells, holes in the bottom for drainage, and a lid.

Like <u>THIS</u> one.

SEEDS

This is the fun part! Decide on whatever seeds you want based on what you want to grow! I love the seeds from <u>Baker Creek</u>
<u>Heirloom Garden.</u>

SEED STORAGE CONTAINERS

I like to store my seeds year after year in photo containers like this one <u>HERE</u>. This will prevent them from getting wet or disorganized.

NUTRITION (FERTILIZER)

You need to feed your seedlings.
I like adding <u>Micorrhizae</u> to my soil when I first begin.

Once I see the first true set of leaves I spray my plants <u>Ocean</u>
<u>Harvest</u> (I use this regularly in my garden too)

LIGHTS (POSSIBLY)

If you don't have a lot of unobstructed natural light, you will need grow lights like <u>THESE</u>.

WATER

You'll need to regularly water your seeds. You can use a regular spray bottle but your hand may get tired. I really like this auto sprayer.

HEAT MATS

I use these to control the soil temperature. Your germination will massively improve with heat mats. I have <u>THESE</u> one.



PLAN YOUR GARDEN

Before you can start your seeds, you will need to know what you want to plant in your garden! I like using the website www.smartgardener.com (it's only \$10). Here is an example of what my plan looks like this year!



KNOW WHEN TO PLANT

This is the part that will vary depending on what zone you live in. In Boise, Idaho, I am in zone 6B. We typically can't plant majority of the garden outdoors until Mother's Day. That is usually the date that the last risk of frost has passed.

Knowing these dates will help you decide when to start your seeds indoors.
